Sign Language Week - March

This week is a flagship awareness week for British Sign Language and Irish Sign Language, celebrated every year in March to commemorate the first time BSL was acknowledge as a sign in its own right by the UK Government on 18th March 2003. According to https://signlanguageweek.org.uk/, the Sign Language Week theme colour this year is turquoise, as inspired by the deaf flag. Last summer, members of the World Federation of the Dear, including BDA, approved the deaf flag. The deaf flag is a powerful symbol for deaf communities around the world.

Turquoise Blue – represents the deaf community and Sign Language pride and unity.

Yellow – represents the colour of light, an enlightened spirit, life and "thriving in unison".

Dark Blue – represents the earth, humanity and living in accordance with the planet. Dark Blue also indicates Deafhood, an individual and collective journey to combat audism and embrace deaf gain.

For many deaf people, sign language is the hear of their living and cultural heritage as it allows people to have a sense of belonging and allows some to feel seen. Together we can change the narrative on our language, and the deaf community, so that future generations inherit a stronger, more inclusive society.
