I always knew I wanted to open my own Brownie unit one day - that day ended up being a lot sooner than I thought!

My Brownie unit is a feeder to a Guide unit. This was a big factor in me deciding to open a unit, as it means the girls will be used to the place we meet as well as the leaders, and will hopefully feel more comfortable moving up to Guides once they turn 10. Another reason I chose to open a unit is to give as many girls as possible in our area an opportunity to experience Brownies, to make memories and new friends.

At the moment we have 17 girls, increasing to 19 after Easter. For our first few meetings, we have been doing lots of activities based on getting to know each other and working on the Promise, building up to our Promise Party on the last meeting of term! I wanted to make sure that the girls knew how important the Promise was and make the party really special for them, hopefully creating a memorable occasion.

It is a big decision to open your own unit as there is so much to consider, but at the same time it is so rewarding! Balancing everything means you need to be organised and work efficiently, but once you are in the swing of things everything falls into place and it is honestly so much fun. You get to meet so many new people and know you are making a difference!

Being a Young Leader, Leader in Training and now Leader means that since turning 14, I have had a great space to work on my leadership skills. Starting by just running games, then working up to planning and executing entire meetings has really pushed me out of my comfort zone and helped me grow in confidence, and has given me valuable, transferable skills I can use both in and out of Girlguiding.
